The Positive Ageing Collaborative represents a unique collaboration between a university (academics from the School of Public Health and Community Medicine (SPHCM, UNSW)) and rehabilitation, aged care and palliative care clinicians from a large not-for-profit aged care provider (HammondCare – a nationally and internationally recognised aged care provider). Established in 2012, the collaborative aims to develop and provide practical programs to help people age as well as they can, whatever their circumstances.

TRACK RECORD

The collaborative has received over 2.8 million dollars in funding from government and NHMRC related projects since 2012. Funded projects have resulted in a number of government reports and scientific and industry conference presentations. Sector guides on reablement and wellness programs are under development. Experts from the Collaborative are currently partnering with the SPHCM to develop and deliver postgraduate education in ageing and health. The Collaborative has successfully conducted a number of industry 'study tours' with participants from China.

The Collaborative focuses on applied research and the translation of evidence-based research into policy and practice. We use both quantitative and qualitative research methodologies. Our focus has been on implementation research and program evaluation. We possess particular expertise in the use of reablement and restorative care strategies, and the use of participatory arts and music engagement, in the delivery of positive ageing programs.
